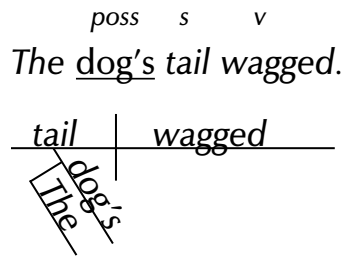


### Possessive Words

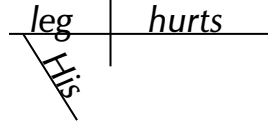

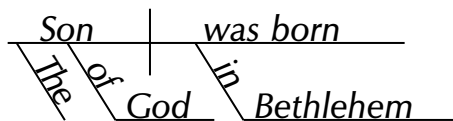

### Prepositional Phrases

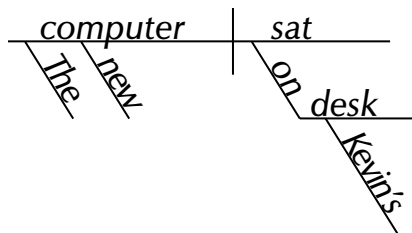
Prepositions are words like *of*, *for*, *by*, *on*, *over*. A prepositional phrase begins with a preposition and contains an object, for example *for the black cow*, or *over the wire fence*. Prepositional phrases can work like adjectives and modify nouns or they can do the work of adverbs and modify verbs.

Diagram a prepositional phrase underneath the word it modifies. Study the examples to see how to diagram a preposition, its object and any modifiers of the object. Some sentences may have two or more prepositional phrases.

*The Son (of God) was born (in Bethlehem).*



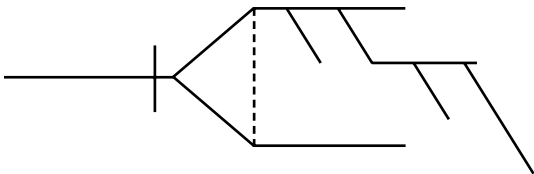

*The new computer sat (on Kevin's desk).*





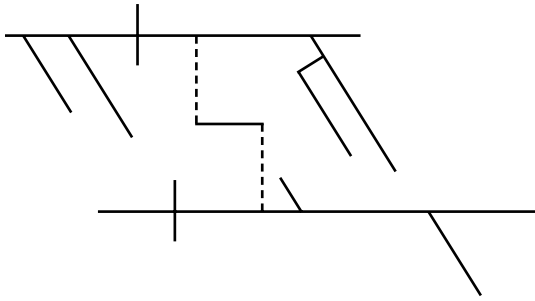

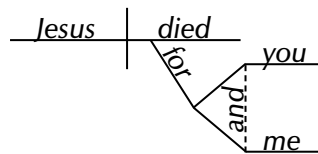
